



Each week, it is important for your child to practise a number of key skills. The home learning for year 2 will consist of the following: a weekly number fact focus, practising spellings and regular reading (aloud to an adult and independently).

Weekly number facts focus:

Reading at home

Please encourage your child to read as often as possible throughout the week. Reading is the key to helping children access the world.

Please record all of your child's reading - including books sent from school and any books of their own choosing - in their individual record book. **If they have finished their book and it needs changing, please make a note of this in their reading record as well.**

Reading strategies

These are some questions you can ask your child when they are reading with you to develop their understanding:

1. Who are the main characters?
2. What can you tell me about them?
3. Where is the story set?
4. Why did ... happen in the story?
5. What do you think will happen next?
6. What does the word ... mean?

Home Learning

Home learning is set on a Friday and is due in by the following Thursday. Children should be reading to an adult at home at least three times per week for ideally 20 minutes each time in order to help increase their fluency and to help develop a love of reading. Reading can take place with either the book sent home from school or an allocated book on your child's [Bug Club](#). Each time they read, please record this in your child's reading record, including any e-books. Trying to find time to snuggle down and get cosy with your child and their book helps to increase the comfort and joy that can be found in reading. It also helps to remove any negative feelings that they might have towards reading.

For their home learning tasks, your child can access [Spelling Shed](#) to enhance and support their spelling practice at home. In addition to this, apps such as [Hit the Button](#), [Times Table Rockstars](#) and [Numbots](#) (you can use your TTRS username and password for this as well) can support with consolidating and securing number facts and knowledge.

Reading at Home

Regular reading at home has a huge impact on children's overall academic and personal growth. This is because reading supports many areas of the curriculum and gives children opportunities to see different perspectives, settings and character experiences. Whether they are losing themselves in a fiction text, or broadening their knowledge and horizons with a piece of non-fiction, reading can be both pleasurable and informative.

Because of the power that reading has, we encourage regular weekly reading. When you listen to your child read, it is truly beneficial if you ask questions to support their ability to retrieve and comprehend the information that they are reading. Ensuring that children understand what they are reading helps them not only in school, but in their own lives. Reading can have a long-lasting personal, social and emotional positive impact.

All children have a Bug Club account which they can access at home. It has a vast library of texts for the children to choose from and read.
